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British people love tea. They drink more than 100 million cups a day! Tea time can be any time, but afternoon tea with cake is special.


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A slang term of a British police officer. They wear tall helmets to stand out in a crowd. They carry batons instead of guns and try to talk to people to keep peace.

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These birds are everywhere in London. They are often called "London's unofficial citizen" because they are always around famous spots like Big Ben.


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A very popular sport in England.
Some matches goes on for days and still end in a draw! Fans even nap during the games and wake up for the most exciting moments!

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














This is also called "the Tube" and it was the first railway in the world under the ground. It opened in 1863. It is a very fast way to get around London.
